SUCCESSFUL MISSION TRIP TO BELIZE

the Mt Hope Bible Church in Unitedville, Belize. God watched over our trip from the very beginning. We had brought over \$2,000 worth of purchased and donated items for the people of Mt Hope Church and the village of Unitedville. We asked for special consideration at customs because we were a mission team coming go help the people of Belize. Nancy Cairns met with the supervisor of the customs agents and he allowed us to claim a value of only \$400. So we paid \$75 instead of \$375. Pastor Allison, Heather, their two daughters and a couple of young men from church picked us up at the airport in the Church's old school bus.

Ah, ten days in sunny and warm Belize, only 14 degrees from the equator. We insulated the ceiling of the Church's Youth Center. No, not to keep the heat in but to keep the heat out. Then we put up 4x8 sheets of 1/8 inch hardboard on the ceiling. Next, we covered the walls with the same hardboard. All the while there were several of us priming and then painting the

outside of the two-story building. John Boyd brought first aid kits and two practice dummies to teach First Aid and CPR at the local Elementary and high schools. John donated extensive first aid kits for both schools and one at the church. Several more team members spent time at the elementary school observing and offering suggestions to assist teachers dealing with unique situations with students.

Christ Church team members included, Father Derik Roy, John Boyd, Alan Greenspan, Rich Osgood, Kelley Howell, Jason Mass, Amy Aguda-Tamah, and Laura and Glen Face. Our team was rounded out by Tom Chimera and Sam Eichorst from the Greenfield Center Baptist Church and Father John and Nancy Cairns from the Adirondack Mission Churches.

We hope to make this an annual event and invite interested people to consider joining us.

Thank you one and all to everyone who contributed to making this mission trip a huge success.

PASTOR'S LETTER



THE REVEREND DERIK J. ROY, JR.

Dear Friends,

I found an app for my phone that I love.

It's from Nicky Gumbel, who is known for the Alpha Course. The app is BIOY—Bible in one Year. Every day he offers scripture readings from the old and new

testament, with some of his commentary. In the course of a year you will read the whole Bible. I love his commentary. Very helpful and inspiring. In the reading the other day Nicky's commentary focused on He Saved You. He wrote:

On 13 January 1982, Air Florida Flight 90 taking off from Washington, DC, crashed into the Potomac River. It was winter and the river was full of ice. The crash happened near a bridge going over the river. The TV cameras could see everything. Millions of viewers, sitting in their living rooms, watched as a helicopter overhead let down a life-belt on a line to a man struggling in the water. He grabbed the line, swam to another survivor just by him, clipped the woman in and they hoisted her up to safety. The helicopter let down the again, and again the man did the same thing. He swam to someone else and rescued them. He saved others, before finally exhausted, he himself drowned.

Why did this man not save himself? The answer is that he was out to save others, in an even more amazing way, Jesus did not save himself because He was out to save you and me.

That's what the season of Lent and Easter focus on: a God who loves us so much that he sacrificed himself so that we might be saved. I pray that speaks to the depth of your heart this Lenten season and that the love He has for us blesses you so that you indeed may be a blessing to others. •

THURSDAY, APRIL 18 • 6 PM • Maundy Thursday Seder

We commemorate the Passover meal Jesus celebrated with the disciples in the Upper Room the night before He was crucified. At this Last Supper, Jesus instituted the sacrament of Communion and washed the feet of his disciples as a sign that they were to be servants. At this meal, you'll learn about some of our Jewish roots and how much of the Christian heritage comes from that tradition. Following the Eucharist, we will begin the allnight Prayer Vigil, reminding us of the time Jesus spent in the Garden of Gethsemane the night before his arrest. There will be a sign-up sheet in the Welcome Center prior to the vigil; we hope every hour until noon on Good Friday will be filled.

Fri., April 19 • Noon & 6 pm • Good Friday Worship

The Noon service includes the Stations of the Cross. The evening service is an opportunity to worship and focus on the cross of Christ.

SATURDAY, APRIL 20 • 8 PM • The Great Easter Vigil

The first Eucharist of Easter will begin in the dark as the Paschal candle is lit. As the congregants light their candles and proclaim "Jesus is the Light of the World," we hear stories from the Old Testament. Then, if there are any to be baptized, we do so, making a commitment to Christ by renewing our own vows. Then, as we turn on the lights and proclaim "Jesus is Risen!" we celebrate the Easter Eucharist.

DAUGHTERS OF THE KING

The Order of the Daughters of the King (DOK) is a National Order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate but not in communion with it. Today, our members include women in the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran (ELCA), and Roman Catholic churches all over the World.

St. Agnes Chapter, here at Christ Episcopal Church, was originally chartered in 1912 and re-instituted in 2004. Currently there are 19 members in good standing.

Members undertake a Rule of Life, incorporating the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service. By reaffirmation of the promises made at Baptism and Confirmation, a Daughter pledges herself to a lifelong program of Prayer, Service, and Evangelism, strengthening the spiritual life of her Parish.

Last year, 2018, was a very productive year for the DOK. We gather together the first Saturday of every month calling this our "Monthly Gathering." Each member is encouraged to host a one-hour gathering, sharing a little about herself and her love for Jesus.

Then, later in the month we choose a day to participate in Action Time, when we as Daughters either take on a Service Project, Evangelize, or Pray together in community.


