Vestry Nominations

We will be electing 4 new members for the Vestry and a new Junior Warden at our **annual meeting on <u>January 30, 2022.</u>** Here is an outline of the nominating process. Please read the qualifications, expectations, etc. Please note that nominations need to be submitted to our church secretary, Jeanne Speer, by **January 23.** (You may place in collection plate or mail to office) If you have any questions or comments, please call the church office at 518-885-1031.

Wardens and Vestry Qualifications, Expectations and Terms of Office. Please give prayerful consideration to whom you would like to nominate for Vestry and please keep in mind the qualifications.

Vestry Member:

- Professes Jesus Christ as Lord and believes in the fundamentals of our faith as expressed in the Creed.
- Age 18 or older.
- Member of Christ Church for greater than one year.
- Regular in attendance to church services (multiple times/month).
- Supports the Biblical mandate of tithing and is either tithing or working towards the tithe.
- Active in at least one ministry of the church.
- Attendance to Vestry meetings and Vestry Ministry meetings mandatory except for occasional excused absences. Vestry members serve for a term of 3 years.

Warden:

- Meets the qualifications of Vestry member.
- Active in multiple ministries of the church.
- Previous experience as a Vestry member.
- Same expectations as Vestry member.
- Lay leader for the congregation.
- Legal representative for Christ Church.
- In the absence of the Rector, pastoral and faith leader for the congregation. Wardens serve for a term of 2 years. 1st year as Junior Warden, 2nd year as Senior Warden.
 - **Note:** Spouses cannot both be current members of the Vestry / Wardens.

Covid Update

As of this writing, masks are mandated at worship and gatherings of 10 or more. We had hoped to return to in-person Sunday School, coffee hour, nursery and more in-person classes, but because of the recent uptick in Covid, we are delaying the start of these until our county reaches the yellow level. Yellow level is 5% -10% infection. The county is currently in the red level, which is over 20%.

Deacon's Corner

Happy Epiphany!

On January 2, as a family was leaving Church, I wished the children a Merry Christmas, pointing out that Christmas actually lasts for 12 days. Noticing a sharp glance from Mom, I hastened to add that we only get presents on the first day.

In other Christian traditions, kids don't get presents on any of the 12 days of Christmas. The big day comes on January 6, the Epiphany, the feast of the Three Kings. The gifts commemorate the treasures they brought to the Christ Child. This custom has a lot going for it: Christmas is all about Christ, gift giving is put into better perspective, and the kids all know what and when the Epiphany is. Do we?

The time after Epiphany is one of the church seasons, ending on Ash Wednesday. In Latin cultures, it is a festive season, beginning with gift giving and ending with a big Mardi Gras party. I'm not sure what other cultures, including dour northern Europeans, make of it. But I would submit the following thoughts about the season.

Epiphany comes from a Greek word meaning to come to light, to be revealed. In Greek translations of the Old Testament, it is associated with an appearance of God. In English, when we say that someone has an epiphany, it refers to some life changing insight or revelation. So the Epiphany is not the event where wise men came and brought gifts. The Epiphany was when they saw the star, which *caused* them to come and to bring gifts. These wise Gentiles understood that a King had been born to the Jews, although they did not have the Scriptures to find him. The Jewish priests and scribes had those Scriptures, and revealed him to the wise men and King Herod. The wise men sought out and paid homage to the King and then returned home, their lives changed. King Herod feared him, and struck out blindly and murderously to kill him. The Jewish priests and scribes were afraid to change, and did not even seek him out.

So, Christmas has come and gone. Now is the time for us to have (or renew) our own Epiphany, to study the Scriptures to understand what God has revealed to us in Jesus. If we are not afraid, it is the time to go to Him, to worship Him, and to present our gifts to Him. -

The beginning of the New Year has been a little rough on KidsFirst. We had an outbreak of Covid in our center and had to shut down for a week in order to be able to maintain ratio and keep the staff and families safe. We were able to order almost \$8,000 worth of supplies for the center through Quality Stars. This is a childcare program that helps rate centers and pays for materials for centers to be in compliance with State requirements for classroom materials. We were able to order new tables and chairs, a new changing table, an indoor gym for our infant room and an infant cove for the itty bitties

to be able to play on the floor safely. Even though we have had some illness, we are looking forward to a really great 2022.

The Quilting Ministry Raffles a Quilt for Noah's Attic

Several months ago a portion of a quilt was donated to Noah's Attic. The donation was the front of a beautiful queen-sized quilt that someone didn't have time to finish. The good people at Noah's Attic knew about the Quilting Ministry at our church and passed it along to them. The quilt was finished by the ministry and they decided to hold a quilt raffle in support of Noah's Attic. The raffle was just completed, raising \$400!

The proceeds from the raffle will be used to support Noah's Attic. And you can bet Noah's Attic will be watching out for more quilt material for the ministry.

Noah's Attic, despite Covid, has had an amazing year, giving thousands of dollars of merchandise away and raising more funds than ever for ministry. The Christmas sale in November raised \$9000, a new high total!
